MAIN GALLERY

In CLOSE ENCOUNTERS, a special video exhibition, universal themes of human nature (private worlds, vulnerability, and the search beyond the 'visible') combine with the distinctive sensibilities of Central Europe. At multiple monitor stations selected videoloops will be played that emphasize Central Europe's human stories.

Projected on the gallery wall will be a portion of a larger project called *Sixtysomething* by Milena Dopitova, a native Czech artist who lives and works in Prague, with additional video revealing how she and her sister 'aged' for the production. Other artists represented, nearly all still residents of their native countries, share in this show their deeply human video-stories. They include Pavlina Fichta Cierna (Slovakia), Hajnal Nemeth (Hungary) who lives and works in Berlin, Katerina Seda (Czech Republic) and Arthur Zmijewski (Poland).

THE GUEST CURATOR

This special exhibition is guest curated by Independent Curator Viera Levitt (formerly Jancekova). She is a native Slovak who shifted her base to Rhode Island two years ago. From 1997-2005 Levitt was director/ curator of the contemporary art showcase, Jan Koniarek Gallery, located in the historic town of Trnava. She was the youngest director ever in a public art museum in the Slovak Republic. Levitt has curated or co-curated more than 30 exhibitions in Slovakia, the Czech Republic, Germany, Austria, Luxembourg and the USA. She is a member of IKT, the International Association of Contemporary Art Curators, and AICA, the International Association of Art Critics.


KINGSTON TRAIN STATION

A component of the exhibition will be mounted in the Historic Kingston Train Station's Amtrak Waiting Room, beginning January 16. Shown in a continuous loop in a bay window, the meditative character of Pavel Mrkus' Seagull, 2005 (with music composed and played by Aziza Sadikova) will intrigue and calm travelers. Mrkus, born in the Czech Republic, is an international digital media and glass artist represented by a gallery in Dresden. He has also taught at RISD as a Visiting Professor. This video combines a romanticized historical interior with a 3D animation of a flying golden seagull. The ambience of the video setting, its mirrors and shining chandelier, strangely echoes the décor of the Kingston Station Waiting Room.
